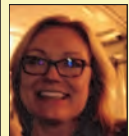

With a huge cheer and massive congratulations to Matt Reay and his team, it was a pleasure to present the front, Falmouth with the awards for both the CAMRA Kernow Pub of the Year 2018 and the CAMRA Kernow Cider Pub of the Year 2018. The presentation by the Cornwall Branch of the Campaign for Real Ale took place on Saturday 14th April. The choice of

beers and ciders is outstanding. CAMRA's National Pub of the Year considers all the criteria that makes a good pub including fundamentally not only the beer and cider quality but the overall experience, the cleanliness, the welcome received, the service provided and the positive reflection of CAMRA's aims to promote Beer, Cider and Perry. This is the first time the Cornwall Branch has chosen the same pub for both awards.

During the selection process for the branch Pub of the Year some others were found to be Highly Recommended and certificates were duly awarded to The Bell, Launceston as runner-up by a small margin. We have since been informed that Nightshade was brewed as a seasonal wheat beer in November, with a six-week best before date. How we came to be served the beer several months later remains a mystery, but if potential customers see the beer again in November/December this year they can expect a pleasant tasting beer from Rebel who have indeed won many awards for their expertly brewed beers.

### Wednesday 23 May-Lizard



A smaller party than normal started the tour at the Old Inn, Mullion on a fine sunny day. As a scaffolding firm were busy dismantling what had been erected to paint the outside of the pub, no picture was taken. It is a very picturesque pub and worthy of a photo. And as a funeral wake was being held in the Mounts Bay we thought we'd better leave that for another day. Onward then to The Lizard where we enjoyed a few pints outside the Witch Ball Inn—pictured left.

We also enjoyed a few beers in the other pub in Lizard village, The Top House before we made our separate ways home.

### July 4— Walkabout Falmouth

As this coincided with American Independence Day it was decided that the Hand Bar in Falmouth should be included on the itinerary as there was every chance they would have some American beers on tap. The team are pictured (right) with hands saying 'Beer Trumps Hate' that we thought appropriate at the time.

This Walkabout was attended by some like-minded CAMRA friends from other branches and Nigel Thomson from East Grinstead takes up the story.

Whilst on holiday, I picked up a copy of the Summer issue of One & Ale and noticed a CAMRA Wednesday Walkabout in Falmouth, which coincided with my stay in Cornwall. I contacted the Social Secretary, Ann Burnett, who very helpfully sent me the complete itinerary, in case public transport let me down on my journey from Fowey (it did not!).



Accompanied by my wife and younger daughter and whilst they indulged in some retail therapy, I met the local group in the first of five planned pubs, The Seven Stars on The Moor – a pub on CAMRA's National Inventory of Historic Pub Interiors. There were about fifteen members present

using both rooms. They made me most welcome, we got chatting



and this led to a very enjoyable afternoon in hot sunny weather. Whilst Sharp's brews are regular here, I chose another regular, non-Cornish offering – Bass, and good it was too.

With about half an hour allowed at each pub, we were soon making our way up the hill that is called High Street to The Hand – a

small, predominantly Craft Beer venue with a large outside area. This had two cask ales available, whilst some tried the Craft offerings, I had a very acceptable pint of Harbour Brewery Ellensburg IPA.

Next we were back down the hill to The Moor for Pennycomequick – the name means "head of the creek", the old Celtic name for Falmouth – this is a St Austell pub, reopened last year, with a mixture of real and craft beers on offer. I chose one of the St Austell short run brews, though I cannot remember the name of it.

Whilst we originally intended to return to Fowey for dinner, which would have cut short my afternoon, a text from my daughter said "We have found a good restaurant for dinner and Mummy says she will pay." Not only a late pass for me, but also a free meal! So I was able to continue with the group for the whole afternoon.

Leaving The Moor, we climbed the long flight of 109 steps – called Jacob's Ladder - leading to a pub of the same name for a well-earned

## Beers, ciders and musical acts revealed in programme

THE full list of beer and ciders which will be available at this year's Newquay Beer Festival have been released in the festival programme which is being circulated to pubs and other places around Newquay and further afield over the next few weeks.

The 48-page programme is also able to be read online at [www.newquaybeerfestival.com](http://www.newquaybeerfestival.com) and includes information about the musicians who will be playing over the three days of the event between Fri 21 - Sun 23 September at Hendra Holiday Park, Newquay.

Amongst the 55 real ales on offer will be some 20 local favourites such as Padstow Brewery's Sun-downer (6.8% ABV), Atlantic Brewery's Azores (4.2%), Sharps' Sea Fury (5%) and Dynamite Valley's T.N.T.I.P.A. (4.8%). From further afield, Dorset's Piddle Brewery will present their 'Slasher' ale (5.1%), Wiltshire's Wadworth Brewery's, 'Swordfish' (5%) and from the Newcastle area, Hadrian Border Brewery's 'Farne Island Bitter' (4%).

Over 20 ciders are also listed and are bound to provide a great choice with names such as 'Rhubarb and Custard', 'Strawberry and Lime', 'Elderflower and Gin and Tonic' and more regular flavours such as 'Farmhouse Scrupmy', 'Apple Slayer' and 'Old Rosie' being long-term favourites.

A great line-up of music will make sure the festival goes with a swing. Friday night headliners, Cornwall's top party band, 'The Qwest' will be back by popular demand for their sixth appearance and Saturday night will conclude with Scott and Nadine of Bow River bringing their international country-rock style to the stage after being so well received at the festival in 2017. Some of the other artists who are continuing to grow their popularity across the region and further afield include Daisy Clark, Aaron and Craig of The Sinking of the Good Ship Rosa, Third Age, Darren Lester, Oll an Gwella, Paula Marcellis and the Good Ol' Boys. Comperre Porky will keep everyone happy with his witty banter and great music while time between the main stage acts will be filled by a series of acoustic performances on the smaller beer marquee stage.

Lion Phil Bunt, one of the festival organisers, said: "Earlybird 3-day tickets are still available at just £12 through [www.newquaybeerfestival.com](http://www.newquaybeerfestival.com) with camping pitches on-site from just £9 a night. With beers, ciders and lagers just £3 a pint throughout, it should be a great value charity weekend organised by Newquay Towan Blystra Lions Club and help add still further to the £30,000 which has been raised for local charities and good causes since the festival started six years ago."

thirst quencher. Some chose to arrive by taxi, the easy way! Previous hill climbing must have got the better of them. This pub serves Skinner's – normally Cornish Knocker, but I went for the Sharp's Sea Fury that was served straight from the cask sat on the end of the bar.

Our final stop was The Seaview in Woodhouse Terrace and, yes, you can see the sea from there. Whilst Doom Bar is the regular beer here, as it was the football world cup, I had to try the Skinner's Kickov. Soon, I received my marching orders to rejoin my two ladies. I had a great afternoon in very pleasant company and I would recommend one of these Walkabouts to you. Another busy weekend for pub festivals your Editor risked public transport on Friday 13th and made it without mishap to the first festival held by the current licensees of the Fox & Hounds at Comford. With the bus stop on the U2– Redruth to Falmouth route right outside the pub, lovely sunny weather and a nice selection of guest beers served at an outside bar in what is otherwise a St Austell tied pub, it was worth the effort and I understand likely to become a regular feature.

Saturday 14 provided a stiffer challenge to reach the Falcon Inn at St Mawgan as there are only two buses a day that pass the pub. Not put off, several members made their way by taking the bus to Newquay Airport and walking down hill from there. Another hot sunny day made the festival that is held in marquees in the pub garden more enjoyable and a good mixture of both locally brewed and out of county beers to choose from. Both this and previously mentioned festivals also had a wide range of real ciders from which to choose. In addition, the Falcon also had a gin bar, with a wide range of locally made spirits to try. Note this will also feature for the first time at the forthcoming Falmouth Beer Festival 4-6 October on Events Square.

Too hot to walk back up the steep hill to catch a bus from the airport the group shared the cost of a taxi back to Newquay.

## PUB NEWS

In Falmouth, the recently (April 2018) closed **Masons Arms** has apparently been bought by Rolf Munding, owner of Wooden Hand Brewery that moved out of Cornwall last year. This is the second classic little town centre boozery he



has bought locally, the first being the **Seven Stars Inn** in Penryn town centre – also still closed. Pictured left.

These both were real unspoilt locals' beer pubs of a type we can ill afford to lose (think Seven Stars, Falmouth), so we might hope that whatever is going on behind the scenes, they would both return to their pub functions in these two towns. One hopeful sign is that workmen moved in to the

Masons Arms in mid-August and are refurbishing it – as a pub – whilst the Seven Stars in Penryn, although firmly closed, still has inside the fixtures and fittings which would indicate continued future use as a pub.

Meanwhile in Porthtowan the **Unicorn** re-opened its doors after five months of closure and it is well and truly open again just in time for the season, offering 2 real ales at the time of visit.



The **White Hart Hotel** Launceston has been sold and is now open again. While in Scorrer the **Fox & Hounds** has been re-

opened by owner Keltek Brewery after refurbishment and structural repairs. A short distance away the **Plume of Feathers** is awaiting new tenants after repairs and refurbishment have been completed.

In the 'Forgotten Corner' in the southeast of the county, a small Millbrook pub has been sold, refurbished and relaunched under a new name.

Formerly the Heart in Hand, it sold no real ale but concentrated on keg beer and lager as well as bottled beer. Now it has been renamed **Tuskers Bar** and sells up to 4 real ales,



its two regular brews being Doom Bar and Tribute, and one or two guest beers generally sourced from south-west microbreweries. It is a small pub which from outside looks like a terraced house; inside the single bar has a stone floor and simple wooden furniture.

### NEW OPENINGS

There has been a spate of new bars opening in Cornwall recently. Whether these can be called 'pubs' in the generally accepted sense (or whether they will last as long) is a matter for conjecture, but most of them seem to be small town bars concentrating on 'craft', keg or bottled beers. In Truro on New Bridge Street, a small operation called **Mr Wolf's Joint** is offering bottled beers and 4 keg taps, but no real ale. Also in Truro, the **Central Bar** has opened. It's located in St Mary's Street in the old Royal British Legion premises. Apparently run by the owner of the Railway Tavern (next to Truro railway station), it has 2 real ales: Sharps Doom Bar and Rebel Gold. It offers BT sport TV and darts and pool. There was at the time of writing still some work in progress making a new bar area in the adjacent room which will be all one area later. Eastwards towards Mevagissey on the St Austell road at Pentewan, a new pub opened at the end of May in the former school building. It's called **Into the Woods** and the new landlord is hoping to build up trade in the busier summer months, keeping the pub open in winter by offering pool, darts and other things the nearby Ship Inn doesn't offer. The only ale on offer as yet is Doom Bar, but it's early days and the choice might expand in the future.

### PUB COMPANIES (Pubcos)

Two major pub companies have restructured their businesses, which has affected the ownership of a number of pubs in Cornwall. Punch Taverns appears to have transferred ownership of many pubs to an organisation called Patron Capital. However, day-to-day management of the pubs will still be done by Punch Taverns. This appears to affect around 70 Cornish pubs. However, a few (6) have been sold to Star Inns (Heineken UK), who themselves have acquired a few other of our pubs, of which the Hole in the Wall, Bodmin and the Red Lion, Mawnan Smith are two examples. Just to confuse the picture further, Patron Capital have themselves sold on a few of the pubs to another outfit, New River Retail. Meanwhile, Enterprise Inns are now to be known as EI Group. WhatPub entries have been suitably updated.

## EDITOR'S DIARY

### 10-12 July Ealing Beer Festival

England football fans will remember the night of Wednesday 11th July when Croatia beat England in the quarter final of the World Cup. Your editor had booked to travel to London in order to attend the West Middlesex branch of the Campaign for Real Ale's 29th Ealing Beer Festival not expecting England's football team to have progressed so far in the competition. He had to leave the festival earlier than originally planned to find a pub that was showing the match, that he could get in (most being packed solid), and that served real ale. Ending up in Shepherd's Bush Wetherspoons drinking Doom Bar out of a plastic glass was not the best way to take the defeat of our boys in Moscow.



Despite this the beer festival held in Walpole Park, Ealing was a success. Having attended this festival several times in previous years your editor knew what to expect in that there were over 500 beers, including 370 cask ales, plus cider/perry, foreign bottled beer, English wines and this year 15 beers served straight from the wood. All this was housed in giant marquees with all kinds of food stalls around the perimeter of a large open air seating area. Fortunately there were passing clouds in an otherwise clear blue sky, but as the sun shone most of the time it was often too hot. All the shady spots under the chestnut trees had been bagged before my arrival.



Despite the heat all the beers I tried were in excellent condition and I managed 10 halves in total, varying from local London beers to those as far afield as the Isle of Arran. I wore my T-shirt with the slogan on the back that reads, "Frogs drink water then croak, drink beer" that I thought appropriate given that France were likely to reach the world cup final at that time. On the way to the festival I called in The Sir Michael Balcon (Spoons), 46 The Mall, Ealing for brunch washed down

with a pint of 'From Russia with Love' from Portobello Brewery. I was staying in a hotel in Bayswater and took a look around the famous Portobello Market that is a short walk away before catching the bus out to Ealing. The previous evening I had refreshed myself after the long Megabus journey from Cornwall in the Prince Edward, a Hall & Woodhouse tied pub on the corner by my hotel. The London



prices for beer at £4.80 were a bit steep. Another pub just a short walk away was the Cock & Bottle (pictured left), a free house with a choice of at least 4 real ales although similarly priced it had a better atmosphere. The Distillery, home of Portobello Road London Dry Gin is pictured on the left amongst the famous street market stalls and antique shops.

## GOOD BEER GUIDE PUB SELECTION

The 2019 Good Beer Guide is now available from the online CAMRA Shop, at the Falmouth Beer Festival, or our Cornwall Branch Pubs Officer, Rod Davis at the next meeting.

You may be asking how the selection process works for each year's Guide? Well the hunt for suitable candidates to go into the each Good Beer Guide is a constant one. As the editor of the guide restricts the Cornwall Branch to the number of entries we are allowed to submit, only the very best, who sell consistently good real ale throughout the year, get selected. Contrary to popular belief, nobody gets 'dropped' out of the Guide – it is effectively scrapped each year and the CAMRA membership has to sit down and argue its way through a new set of candidates and do a re-write. To help us in our selection, we collect beer quality information through CAMRA's National Beer Scoring System (NBSS) in which members are asked to contribute scores for beers that they have tasted in pubs throughout the year. This information is then used during the meetings in January and February each year to assist with the selection process.

The easiest way to score beers is by using the online pub guide WhatPub (<http://whatpub.com>) using your membership number and chosen password. Search for the pub on the data base using pub name, town or follow the drop down menus that are there to help. Submit your beer score from 0-5 and all these will be forwarded to the branch coordinator. A version of WhatPub optimised for use on a smart phone and a downloadable app are now available, so that you can now score your beer in the pub while you drink it! If you don't have online access at all (and we appreciate that not all members have this means of reporting beer scores) you can ask your NBSS Coordinator which in Cornwall CAMRA's case is Steve Barber. He will normally be at any branch meeting with paper forms that he will then be able to enter your scores for you. To make this selection system work at its optimum we need many more members of CAMRA to submit their scores.

We ask members to score the pubs continually not just once or twice. Please spend a small amount of time beer scoring and be an active member.

### 7 August Great British Beer Festival, Olympia London

My second trip this year to London was for the Tuesday trade session of the Campaign for Real Ale's flagship beer festival. Organised this year for the first time by Catherine Tonry, both she and the other 1,000 or so dedicated volunteers gave up their own time without getting a penny in return to make the festival another resounding success.



One of the many advantages of being able to attend the trade session on the Tuesday before the festival is opened to the public at 5pm is that you can meet and chat to many fellow brewers. Your editor and Cornwall CAMRA members Ann Burnett, Graham Whiting and Brian Spurling were joined at the last minute by former Cornwall member Chris Riley who travelled from Liverpool with his fellow employees of Big Bog Brewery.



The judging of the Champion Beer of Britain is undertaken at the festival and the results were announced at 3pm on the main stage. This year the only Cornish breweries to receive awards were St Austell Brewery with a Joint Bronze in the Best Bitter Category for Tribute and Tintagel Excalibur that won a Gold Award for Old Ales/Strong Milds in the Champion Winter Beer Competition.

## OUT & ABOUT WITH CORNWALL CAMRA

### 1 August Wednesday Walkabout—Newlyn & Mousehole

Most members met on the train to Penzance that happened to be one of the shortened 125s, refurbished to replace the lightweight multiple units. St Austell Tribute or Skinner's Lushingtons was in the former, while Sharp's Doom Bar, St Austell Tribute or Marston's Pedigree in the latter. We all re-joined in the Star, where the only real ale was Wye Valley HPA. A nice change this was too, but one of the locals looked a bit worried that we might drink all his favourite beer!

Back on the M6 bus again to Mousehole where the first port of call was the Trewavas, formerly the Royal British Legion Club. It is still the RBL headquarters, but has Skinner's Betty Stogs as a regular beer and a guest beer that on this occasion was Cornish Crown One Hop One Grain. This tiny fishing village has two more pubs just a short walk from each other and it wasn't long before we were in The Ship. This St Austell tied pub had four of their beers on the pumps, Cornish Best Bitter, Tribute, Proper Job or HSD. Most of us plumped for the latter and enjoyed the cosy atmosphere and unspoilt interior. When we moved on to the Old Coastguard we all took advantage of the lovely sunny weather and fantastic views out to sea while a choice between Cornish Crown Causeway, Padstow Windjammer, St Austell Tribute or Skreach Cider satisfied everyone's taste.

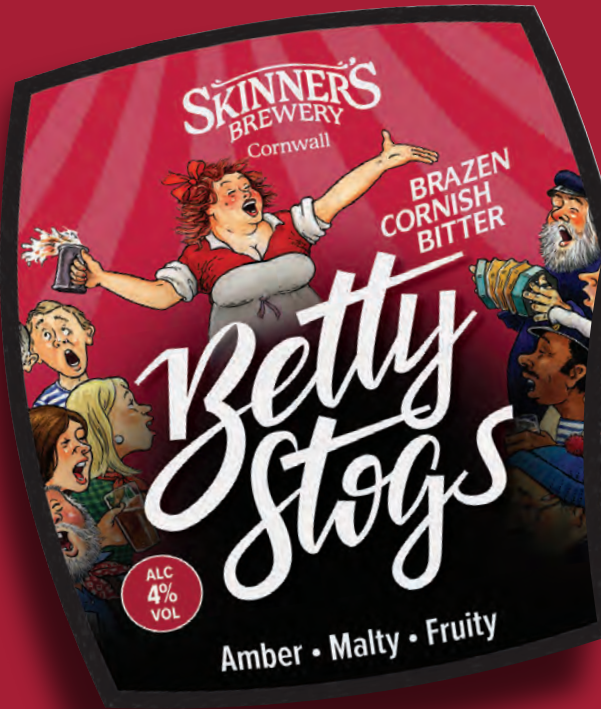
